The occasional offices, Baptism, Weddings and Funerals, will be mostly looked after by the Revd Gerry Booker, but he will not be able to do everything and it is hoped that neighbouring clergy will kindly help.

The parish magazine will be edited by the Parish Administrator, Martin Penny. This is a big task and it is essential that he is given articles and information. If you have something you want to write about, why not give him an article? A description of an interesting place you have visited, thoughts that have come to you about Christian truth, or something you want to blow your top about – a controversial article is always more interesting to read than a bland one!

Many good things are being planned including an Activity Day in Half Term Week on Friday 27th October. The Parochial Church Council are determined that the Vacancy will not be a period of retreat, but a time when the parish stands on its own feet and grows.
