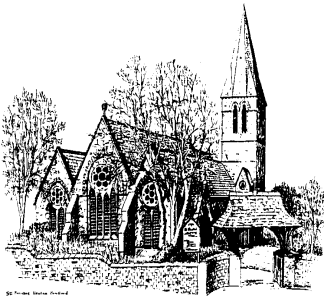

Bell Ringer's Outing

"One of the best outings I have been on." That was John Kemp's verdict after this year's Ringers Outing, held on 6th October.

North Hertfordshire and Cambridgeshire was this year's venue, beginning with two rings of 8 bells. We started at St John the Baptist, Royston before driving into Cambridgeshire to Holy Trinity, Meldreth. All were agreed that these are an extremely musical ring of bells - no wonder they are popular with those who spend most of their spare time on the end of a rope.

The final three towers of the day each contained 6 bells. First All Saints, Barrington, where the bells have recently been refurbished and rehung with the aid of a substantial grant from the Lottery Heritage Fund – and a good job they have made of it too. Next was All Saints, Haslingfield which sounded splendid but were a little more difficult to ring. Finally into the outskirts of Cambridge to St Andrew, Cherry Hinton – another fine ring of 6 bells.

All of the bells were easy to ring, and we produced a very high standard of ringing

which added to the day's pleasure. As an added bonus, three of the five towers were rung from the ground floor, reducing the number of stairs to be climbed!

There was one more stop to be made as we drove into Fulbourn and the appropriately named 6 Bells for supper. Unfortunately some had to leave before supper; nevertheless all who had stayed enjoyed both a splendid meal and a fine selection of real ales.

As always we were joined by friends old and new to renew friendships and catch up on news and activities.

All the best reports now seem to mention a "star of the day". For us this would have to be Lorraine Brown, who has been ringing for less than a year but rang extremely well all day. Even better, these were the first towers she has visited outside Hertford.

Jill Crocker again made all the arrangements with the towers and our thanks go to her for all her efforts.

Maltings Sinfonia Winds
Barbara Manning. *Piano*

Earlier this year we welcomed the Maltings Sinfonia to All Saints' for the first time, On that occasion local pianist, Barbara Manning, joined them for a performance of Beethoven's fifth piano concerto. On this occasion, Barbara will

join wind players from the Ware based orchestra for a performance of Mozart's Quintet for Piano and Winds in E flat major.

Asasello String Quartet

Piano Quintet in F minor - Brahms

The Asasello Quartet will be appearing at the Wigmore Hall, London, on the 16th of this month with Jill Crossland so we are very pleased that they will visit All Saints' as part of their preparations. The Quartet is based in Switzerland and the four musicians formed the group in 2000 having met at the music school in Basel. Since then they have given concerts throughout Europe and Russia and many of their performances have been broadcast on Swiss Radio. In 2005 the Asasello quartet recorded its debut CD containing works by Beethoven, Kojevnikov and Mendelssohn.

For those of you with a literary interest, the Quartet takes its name from a novel 'The Master and Margarita' by Michail Bulgakov, finally published 1967 having been banned by Russian authorities for thirty years.

Adam Magee - *Tenor*

Adam Magee graduated from the Royal Northern College of Music in 2002 and subsequently took up a place on the opera course at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama studying with Peter Alexander Wilson. Whilst at the RNCM, he performed in many of the college's productions and more recently has worked with a number of companies both here and abroad. He is currently singing at Scottish Opera in their performances of *Il Barbiere di Siviglia*.

Corina Vince - *Violin*

David Boarder - *Piano*

Bringing to a close our celebration of Elgar's life and work, Corina and David will perform his Violin Sonata in E minor Op.82. This Sonata was one of three chamber works Elgar composed more or less concurrently towards the end of the First World War at Brinkwells, the country cottage the Elgars had rented near Fittleworth in Sussex. Elgar was himself a competent violinist and work proceeded quickly to completion in little over a month. The first performance was given by violinist W.H. Reed at the Aeolian Hall, London in March 1919.
