The older children spent time researching the correct colours for their chosen addition in the nature books, but by the time the younger ones were at the table I was too busy to notice how much research they were doing! It was particularly successful and is now on display in church.

Other activities included colouring, pebble painting, hair braiding (not just for girls), a fishing game, origami, sand pictures, seagull mobile making and rock pool pictures. Over in the church a dramatisation of Matthew's story was being rehearsed ready for a performance later. In the Church room a representative from the Royal National Lifeboat Institution was showing slides and giving a talk about the vital work of the RNLI.
