VICAR'S VIEWPOINT

Keep working on the Tapestry of Faith

Dear friends,

During the summer St Leonard's hosted a wonderful art exhibition which included textile work by Elspeth Kemp: framed embroidered collages and some of her ecclesiastical vestments and altar frontals. Her embroideries are often inspired by her faith. Whilst looking at her work I realised that our own faith is rather like a richly textured embroidery with its many coloured threads and materials forming the work of art.

Our faith starts off, perhaps, with a plain coloured background material, possibly formed in our childhood, based on a simple construction, loosely woven, incorporating Bible stories, our own experiences within our family and from school and learned prayers. As we grow, some of these threads will be pulled, often at the time making us feel rather raw and disconcerted, as these events seem like gaps or holes, as pieces of the picture seem less relevant and or don't fit. But then, other threads and materials are added, as our experience of life and our relationships with God and other people form more deeply, producing a greater texture. Sometimes the feelings and colours fade, and pull apart. New ideas are sewn into our faith, some that work, others leading to changes and some that need to be removed, but all the experiences and feelings can be seen as adding to the fullness and the depth of our faith.

There can be times when our faith seems as though it is not getting anywhere, just as there are times in the creation of a piece of art when the artist may need to find new inspiration, but then times when everything comes together in an amazing way. If we look back to that first plain material faith, we realise that it has to be added to and pieces removed for the depth and subtlety to form.

This Autumn, with its new term start, can be a great time to look at our faith afresh, join one of our new Bible Study groups, pick up Bible reading notes, or come to a service which you may not have been to for some time: Evensong at 6.30pm, our early Book of Common Prayer Holy Communion at 8.00am or the lovely midweek Choral Compline on Wednesdays at 7.15pm or our new short Choral Matins at 8.30 am on the second Sunday of the month. We will also be having a different service on the fourth Sunday evening of the month and this month it will be a healing service, with prayers for healing (healing in one's own life, for others, or the world), music and a reflection.

Let us learn to cherish the experiences that add to our faith tapestry and even those that remove allow worship, prayer, music, the company of others and the beauty of our flower festival next month to deepen our understanding of God, our spirituality and faith.

Holy Communion and Swine Flu

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York have strongly urged all Churches, during the swine flu pandemic, not to share the Chalice and not to share the Peace by shaking hands. They have suggested this as it would be very sad if people felt concerned about catching swine flu when they attend church, especially those who are most frail and those who may become very ill if they caught an infection. I am sure that, like me, you miss that all important feeling of togetherness but

The risk of catching any infection is really extremely low but, as the Archbishops point out, perceptions and fears need to be allayed and people need to feel reassured. Let us all pray that this pandemic dies down very soon and that people are not too badly affected by it.

September 20th: the meaning of the Bread and Wine

October 18th: Forgiveness and Praise (Confession, absolution and the Gloria)

November 15th: Holiness, and Mission (Sanctus, Blessing)

Junior Church will be learning more about Communion at their sessions in St John's Hall on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month and then we will have another get together of children and families on November 15th at 5.15pm in St John's Hall.
