### View from the Churchwardens Pew

It seems hard to believe that Advent is already upon us and we are preparing for Christmas! Admittedly I have been thinking of Christmas somewhat earlier than I have ever done before but I am enjoying doing things in a slow and relaxed way for once rather than rushing around! I have enjoyed making numerous Christmas cakes which I hope will have sold at the Winter Bazaar to raise lots of money by the time you read this!

All Saints is recycling! I also have been busy making new candles from the remains of used ones in church. There was around 25lbs of wax retrieved from the candles over the year and this had been used to remould over 130 new candles of various shapes and sizes some of which will be used in church over Christmas and some have been sold to raise some money.

Sadly we are unable to use St John's Hall at the present time due to a burglary which took place on the night of Sunday / Monday 14<sup>th</sup> / 15<sup>th</sup> November. Thieves broke in and have stolen all the copper piping of the heating and plumbing systems, cutting it close to radiators, sinks and the water tanks and leaving an awful mess in their wake where the systems have drained onto the floor. It is very sad after the hard work that went into the decoration in the summer and it will take a few weeks to get sorted and replumbed and cleaned. It means we will lose around £1000 in bookings to say nothing of the cost of repair and increased insurance rates. If, by any chance, you saw any strange activity around the hall on Sunday night please let us know and report it to the local police. We hope it will be sorted out by mid December but it does depend on the damage found as the repairs are done

The Vestry refurbishment has now been completed and although it took longer than anticipated, I hope you will agree that it looks spick and span now. We hope it will no longer be the dumping ground for bits nobody is sure about, and it has been a voyage of exploration looking in the nooks

and crannies! We have found pictures of All Saints in varying degrees of dilapidation, old magazines, a list of who made each of the hassocks and where it should be in church, and various shoes, jumpers and jackets! I hope the Choir find it a more welcoming place to meet than they have for some years, and that we can keep it clean and tidy.

The Welcome Teams are now in place and if anyone is interested in taking part in this important task please speak to Andrew who is sorting the rota out, or myself and we can explain more.



# On the edge of the Chilterns

Saturday 2 October dawned dry even if somewhat cloudy. For this the bellringers were duly grateful since this was the day of the annual outing. This year we visited some of the villages to the north of Aylesbury, starting in Bierton, a most pleasant village rather spoiled by the busy main road running through its centre. The six bells here are rung from the centre of the Church, in the Chancel crossing. The bells are of some interest since they were founded by John Briant of Hertford (who cast the bells at St Andrews). Moving on, we next rung at Hardwick, another very old ring of bells, where the tenor weight was advertised as 12 cwt, but which certainly felt as if it was much heavier. Another John Briant bell here which appears to have been cast much later than the other bells in the tower. One can only assume this was an augmentation project.

The next village was Whitchurch, which again includes a John Briant bell although it is interesting that Thomas Mears (of London, and whose foundry continues to operate today as the Whitechapel Bell Foundry) cast two bells at about the same time. After a welcome cup of tea (and doughnuts for some), on again to Quainton, scheduled to be the only 8 bell tower of the afternoon. Alas, despite reminders having been sent, we were unable to ring since the keyholder failed to arrive in time. Perhaps next year.

Quainton church is particularly notable for the statues in the Church, including a large one in the ringing room (we got into the ringing room, but the rope spider was padlocked – this was the key we did not have). The final tower of the day was North Marston, no John Briant bells here, but a relatively modern (1925) six founded by Mears & Stainbank (Whitechapel).

As always we had the great pleasure of the company of friends old and new and finished with a meal in *The Pilgrim* (formerly The Bell) in North Marston. Fortunately the dry weather had held while we were ringing, and rain only appeared during the journey home.

This year the organisation was in the hands of Jill Reeves and Andrew Case and we would like to thank them for all their efforts. Particular congratulations are due for finding five towers where ringing was from the ground floor.

We also thank the incumbents at the various churches we rang in as well as those fellow ringers who turned out to unlock doors and let us in.
