Pack the app, says CofE,

as downloads reach 100.000

Join the 100,000 strong app crowd - led by the Archbishop of York - and get a daily dose of prayer and reflection wherever you are, say church leaders. Whether at home or on holiday, the five different free apps from Church House Publishing (CHP), are reaching Christians across 140 countries via their smartphones or tablets.

The Archbishop of York Dr John Sentamu said: "I use the apps regularly whilst I am travelling. I even used the app on a recent overseas trip to Ephesus and Cairo, so didn't need a suitcase full of books with me - marvellous!"

The Ven Christine Hardman, Archdeacon emeritus of Southwark said she had found the Daily Prayer app invaluable on her 2,500 mile cycle trip this year, along the

East coast of the United States. "Not only did it supply the Bible readings, but also the prayers so I didn't need any books."

The Daily Prayer app released earlier this year is free to download. It is the fifth app to be released by the CofE and complements existing apps including Reflections for Daily Prayer, Sunday Worship and the Lectionary of Services for the Church of England.

Celebrate 100

On August Bank Holiday Monday this much awaited event took place at Keysoe Equestrian Centre, deep in the heart of rural Bedfordshire, to celebrate the 100 years of service of the Diocese of St Albans in Bedfordshire, Hertfordshire, Luton and Barnet.

A full programme of fun and games had been planned including Dog and Falconry Displays, Messy Centenary church, The Charnborough Ring (a portable bell tower to enable everybody to have a go at bell ringing without having to climb a bell tower) and displays of magic and information about Diocesan activities.

There was also to be a varied musical programme, with gospel Choirs and the highly talented Jonathan Veira as well as preaching and teaching from Very Rev Jeffrey John, Dean of St Albans Abbey, a much loved local preacher and storyteller. Pam Rhodes, much admired local presenter of Christian broadcasting, was also to be a key member of the team taking part.

The afternoon was to end with a Festival Eucharist which would involve the thousands of people expected to attend. In fact most of this did actually happen - despite the absolutely awful weather!!!

August Bank Holiday has a habit of being a wash out and this year was no exception. Due to the choice of a venue with a vast indoor arena and much hard work over-night on the Sunday to bring over a thousand chairs inside that arena, and the fact that several events were already due to take part in marquees, and also that the people of the Diocese of St Albans are not fair weather Christians, the event was hailed as a great success by all who attended!


Yes, we got wet and muddy but when, after enjoying the events of the day, we all came together to celebrate the Eucharist; the feeling of joy and fellowship was shared and appreciated by everybody.

The bread and wine was shared amongst us and we administered to each other which, although unusual, was highly spiritual and the sound of several thousand (damp but not downhearted) people of all ages singing such stirring hymns as He who would valiant be and To God be the glory is something I will long remember.

The official number of attendees (for at least some part of the day) was 4000, perhaps not as many as might have come had the weather been fine, but for those who did manage to get to Keysoe it was a thoroughly enjoyable day and a wonderful opportunity to feel that we were part of a huge family which consists of the whole worshipping Community in the diocese of St Albans.

Many thanks to all who had the vision and the organisational skills to provide the opportunity to attend this once in a lifetime event for the people of the Diocese of St Albans.


Once again, many thanks to you all for supporting all that we are doing, and will continue to do, at All Saints.
