

Stairway to Heaven

Dear Friends,

This is our Summer Newsletter, and over the years many of us have been used to going on holiday at this time. This time it feels different as we haven't been able to have a holiday for most of the last two years. My breaks over that period, when permitted, have been entirely family visits with some restrictions even then. I imagine that it has been the same for all of us. But in early June we managed to actually go away for a week on an actual holiday. We stood on the bridge crossing the Douro in Porto and realized that, yes, we are really on holiday, I think I remember this sort of feeling from the distant past.....

Porto is a delightful place to visit, though it helps if you are a hillwalker. And it's probably a vital place of pilgrimage if you are a true Harry Potter fan. We loved it, the whole city, including the Port Lodges on the South side of the river. What a rich history. Just don't ask about the Francesina!



I prefer to avoid "bus driver's holidavs" where possible, but it is rarely an option considering the wonders to be found in many churches. In Porto thev often have wonderful blue tiles on the interior and exterior, some are rich in golden decorations, there is

so much evidence of devotion to God's ways including some all-too-accurate representations of the Crucifixion.

In two churches, where all that glitters is indeed gold, I noticed an unusual feature behind the altar. A set of 7-10 white stairs, becoming slightly smaller as they rise. I asked



a Portuguese guide what it was and he replied that it was a Stairway to Heaven. Admittedly that is just what it looked like, but I hadn't expected precisely that phrase. Perhaps the Church of God was right to use that concept after all, because

it's a good one.

The idea of the stairway rising could sound mundane - most homes have one -but in its setting the perception of an open way to rise to heavenly places is a helpful one. In its own way it speaks of transcending the ordinariness of life to aspire to something much greater.



Beina aware that we are called to a higher form of devotion and service is inspiring, even though going upwards can additional require energy. It can also help us to think of coming closer to God as our journey through life continues.

The Book of Psalms has numerous ancient hymns described as "A Song of Ascent", between 120 – 134. They are some of the most delightful and encouraging writings in that old "Hymn Book of the Second Temple". They are literally 'uplifting' and they were used as the people of Israel ascended Mount Zion to the holy city of Jerusalem. It was seen as a time of coming together to celebrate and encounter the presence of God, symbolized in the Temple itself. For us, a pilgrimage or sacred journey can be valuable in seeking to understand ourselves better and to look afresh at our faith in God. And a break from routine on a holiday can give us cause for reflection about what is important in our daily living. It is also true, of course, that any time of joining with others in worship, any time of leaving ordinary life for a sacred place and ceremony, can fulfil this need (including our normal church attendance).

We need to be aware that our spiritual journey can – and ultimately will be - a joy but it needs our willingness to engage with the weights that hold us down, our human nature which is estranged from God. We cannot just go blithely "Running Up That Hill", for the weight of our sins will hold us back. It is Jesus – crucified just outside Jerusalem's city walls – who carried our sins to the cross to gain our forgiveness. He wants to draw us to himself, upward in the sense of transcending the pains and evils of this world, and that Stairway to Heaven is open for us all to enter into the fulness of eternal life.


We are also planning the following, dates yet to be set:
